Rules

1. The Society shall be known as Dalmally Agricultural Society.
2. Show areas for 2010 shall be as follows:-
 - (a) Cattle-confined-to the parishes of Glenorchy and Innishail, Kilchrenan, Dalavich, Village of Lochawe, Inveraray, Part of the parish of Kilmorich to north of River Kinglas and part of the Parish of Ardchattan east of River Etive to its junction with Allt Fhaolain and thence along Parish Boundary to its junction with the Parish of Glenorchy.
 - (b) Cattle-Open
 - (c) Sheep-confined- as (a) above.
 - (d) Sheep-Open
 - (e) Crooks and Sticks-Confined to North and South Lorn and the Parish of Inveraray, Glenaray and Kilmorich.
 - (f) Crooks and Sticks-Open
 - (g) All other Sections-Open.
3. Membership is open to all. Subscriptions for full membership will be £4.00 payable to the treasurer or entry secretary by closing date for entries. Members are admitted to the Show free of charge on production of their membership tickets. Otherwise full entry is applicable.
4. Any number of stock entries may be made, but total entry fees will not exceed £20.00 plus the membership fee. All livestock exhibitors must be members. Entry fees are as follows:

Cattle and Sheep (all classes)	£1.00 per entry
Dogs (paid on field)	£1.00 per entry
Poultry	£0.50 per entry
Childrens classes (paid on field)	£0.20 per entry
All other Classes	£0.30 per entry
5. 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize-winners in the confined Cattle and Sheep classes will automatically be eligible to enter the corresponding classes in the open sections.
6. Competitors will lodge their entries in writing with the entry secretary by the date specified on the entry forms.
7. At least 3 months prior to the date of the Show all stock exhibits at the Show must be owned by the exhibitor.
8. All vegetables must have been grown by the exhibitor, all baking, knitting produce, jam, sticks etc must be the work of the exhibitor and not exhibited previously at Dalmally Show.
9. Only amateurs will be allowed to compete in all sections other than livestock sections.
10. Riggs or chasers are not eligible.
11. No animal can be exhibited for a special prize if it has not been shown in its class.
12. All bulls and pedigree cattle are to be led.
13. No hard teeth permitted in animals exhibited in calf classes. Two hard teeth only permitted in animals exhibited in classes for young heifers and bulls. Four hard teeth only permitted in animals exhibited in classes for two year old heifers and bulls.
14. Only one person allowed in judging ring with cattle.

15. All exhibits must be placed in the Show yard by 09.30am except Crooks and Sticks by 10.30am and **must not be removed before 4pm**, unless special permission is obtained from the Steward. The removal of any exhibit before this hour may involve the forfeiture of prizes. All judging to commence at 10 am except Crooks and Sticks and Photographs at 11am and Dogs at 2.30pm. The committee will be in attendance from 9am to receive and place exhibits. All exhibits except Cattle, Sheep and Poultry must be removed by 5pm.
16. 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and HC prizes will be awarded in cattle and sheep classes. The points in the sheep classes shall be 7, 5, 3 and 1 – in the event of a tie the number of 1st, 2nd, 3rd places will be taken into account. In all other classes 1st, 2nd, 3rd and HC will be awarded. The points shall be 5, 3 and 1 – in all events of a tie the number of Highly Commended will be taken into account.
17. Any exhibitor or his representative refusing to accept the judge's placing in any class will be disqualified. All disputes will be settled by President, Secretary and relevant Steward; all objections must be lodged by 6pm the day following the Show and a £10.00 deposit made. The deposit will be forfeited if the objection is not sustained.
18. The Society will not be liable in any claim for loss or damage arising from accidents or otherwise at or in connection with the Show.
19. A donation of not less than 10% will be made to the Society from the sale of exhibits.
20. All trophies to be returned to the secretary one month prior to the date of the Show.
21. Shared ownership must be declared on entry form.

Livestock Exhibitor Regulations

Show CPH 68/171/8000

All exhibitors must acknowledge and agree to observe the under noted regulations and conditions that shall form part of all entries, in addition to the Societies rules as set out in the schedule

1. All exhibitors must complete an entry form for all livestock entered.
2. Names and addresses of all stock handlers must be supplied to the secretary with your entry form, any changes notified to the steward on show day.
3. Cattle health IBR rules apply, status should be forwarded with entry forms.
4. Sheep that are part of the scrapie-monitoring scheme must be individually listed on the entry form (class and tag number) and must be non-pregnant, have not lambed within 30 days prior to the show and not be subject to procedures that change the seasonal breeding pattern.
5. Exhibitors must adhere to the transportation of animals (cleansing and disinfection) (Scotland) regulations 2005.
6. Separate movement documentation must be completed in full to move sheep to the showground, and back home, and then sent to SAMU.
7. All livestock should be double tagged according to current legislation.
8. Cattle passports must accompany all cattle to the show. Any animal without a passport cannot be unloaded and penned.
9. All cattle passports must be taken to the passport steward in the market before 10am on show morning.
10. All exhibitors must be aware of their responsibility in maintaining the safety of the public when moving animals.
11. Exhibitors must comply with any additional regulations as set down by the Scottish Government. Which are in force on Show day.

Poultry Regulations

Exhibitors of Poultry must comply with regulations as set out by the State Veterinary Division in accordance with avian influenza (preventive measures) (Scotland) Order 2007

1. All litter and manure within cages or baskets must be contained until disposal, any spillages outside the cage must be cleansed and disinfected immediately
2. All litter and manure must be disposed of in a manner, which does not present a risk of spread of the disease i.e. in a sealed bag for normal refuse collection so that other birds do not have direct access to it.
3. All exhibitors must cleanse and disinfect any cages, crates or baskets they take to the show before the event, and are advised to cleanse them on return home before using to hold another bird.
4. The secretary requires the home and business address of poultry exhibitors, please ensure both are present on entry forms (if different).
5. In the event of exhibited birds been kept at a different address to that supplied in the 28 days prior to the Show, please ensure these details are given to the secretary on Show day.
6. Any birds sold on Show day must be reported to the secretary, with details of the purchasers name and address (home and business).

Paradise Cake

Ingredients:

8 oz shortcrust pastry

Raspberry jam

4 oz margarine

4 oz caster sugar (4 rounded tablespoons granulated sugar)

1 beaten egg

2 tablespoons chopped glacé cherries

2 tablespoons ground almonds

2 tablespoons chopped walnuts

Vanilla essence (extract)
Caster sugar (granulated sugar) for dusting

Method:

Roll out the pastry on a floured surface and use it to line a greased 11 inch by 7 inch baking tin. Bake this initially on its own in a pre-heated oven for ten minutes at 350F/175C/Gas Mark 4. Cream the margarine and sugar together and stir in a beaten egg, cherries, walnuts and almonds. Add the vanilla essence/extract and mix well. Spread a layer of raspberry jam on the bottom of the pastry case (after the ten minute baking) and spoon in the mixture on top of the jam. Bake for 30/35 minutes. On removing it from the oven, sprinkle with sugar and leave to cool in the tin. When it is cold, remove from the tin and cut into squares.

Sticky Marmalade Tealoaf

Ingredients:

140g/5oz Marmalade (set aside 1tbs in a small pan)
175g/6oz butter softened
175g/6oz light muscovado sugar
3 eggs beaten
225g/8oz self-raising flour
½ tsp baking powder
2tsp ground ginger
1tsp mixed spice
100g pecan halves

Method:

1. Preheat the oven to 180C/ fan oven 160C/ Gas 4, grease and line a 2lb loaf tin.
2. Blend marmalade, butter, sugar, eggs, flour, baking powder and spices for 1-2 minutes until smooth and light. Stir in about ¾ of the pecans.
3. Tip into prepared tin and smooth the top. Sprinkle with the reserved pecans.
4. Bake for 1 – 1 ¼ hours until skewer inserted comes out clean. Carefully remove from the tin and cool slightly on a wire rack.
5. Gently heat the set-aside marmalade, stirring until smooth, and spread the glaze over the top of the warm loaf.

Tomato Jam Recipe

Ingredients:

- 2lbs tomatoes (Any colour of tomato is fine to use, but larger varieties are easier to peel. See below for more information.)
- 3 cups light brown sugar
- Zest of 2 large lemons
- Zest of 2 large oranges
- 1 tablespoon fresh-squeezed lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons of peeled and grated ginger
- 2 cinnamon sticks

To begin, peel, core, seed and slice the tomatoes. In a large pot, mix the tomatoes with the sugar, both zests, lemon juice, ginger and cinnamon sticks. Cover and simmer for an hour, stirring occasionally. Remove the lid and increase the heat to a medium-high temperature and cook for another 2 hours until the jam reaches a desired texture. Make sure to stir every so often so that the mixture does not burn. Remove the cinnamon sticks, cool, pot and cover.
